



# Le Vaillant



### The sensation of the text

- Translated across Europe
- Best seller
- 1789/90 publication
- Warm response from King and Revolutionary Parliament alike
- Review in the Journal des Scavans complains that there is no map

### De Laborde and the royal court

- All round genius of the age: music theorist, translator, map-maker
- Had produced educational maps for the Dauphin
- His wife a reader for Marie-Antoinette

## Look at the map in detail: I

- Map of his travels marked in red
- Reminder of major features of his books
- Map of animal distribution
- Innovative in botanical illustration

### Look at the map in detail: II

- Why so large and how Louis XVI would have viewed it
- Louis XVI and travel
- Papillons or butterflies inserted afterwards
- Produced on cloth, not silk
- Top artists and geographers of the day involved
- Inaccuracies!

### The map and how it survived

- Why is Le Vaillant in the military map section?
- Best map of its time?
- Laborde executed during the Revolution
- To preserve the map?
- Le Vaillant never wrote about the map directly
- During World War I and II
- Exhibition in 2013/14 in Cape Town first showing for 222 years
